- Prepare document templates and create documents using templates.
- Create bookmarks and insert text using bookmarked ranges.
- Prepare printed and onscreen forms.
- Create a presentation from an outline.
- Add footnotes, a title page, and table of contents to a report.

CHILDREN ON CAMPUS
