II. COURSE INFORMATION

A. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>

An analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of Aggregate Demand and Aggregate Supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy.

- **B.** PREREQUISITE: None. However, it's preferred that students have taken or are currently enrolled in MATH 1324.
- C. <u>CREDIT:</u> Lecture 3; Lab 0
- **D.** <u>CORE CURRICULUM</u>: This course partially satisfies the Core Curriculum Requirement for Social and Behavioral Science Foundational Component Area (080).

E. CORE CURRICULUM OBJECTIVES ADDRESSED:

- Communications skills—to include effective written, oral and visual communication
- Critical thinking skills—to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information

- **Empirical and quantitative competency skills**—to manipulate and analyze numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions
- **Personal Responsibility**—to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Social Responsibility**—to include the demonstrated knowledge and competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

F. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- **1.** Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision making.
- **2.** Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- **3.** Define and measure national income and rates of unemployment and inflation.
- **4.** Identify the phases of the business cycle and the problems caused by cyclical fluctuations in the market economy.
- **5.** Define money and the money supply; describe the process of money creation by the banking system and the role of the central bank.
- **6.** Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model of the macroeconomy and use it to illustrate macroeconomic problems and potential monetary and fiscal policy solutions.
- 7. Explain the mechanics and institutions of international trade and their impact on the macroeconomy.
- 8. Define economic growth and identify sources of economic growth.
- **9.** Address issues, policies, public opinions, expectations, environmental, and cultural changes that affect industry, society, choices, and the current economic state.

A. <u>ATTENDANCE POLICY:</u>

As an online class, students still have to access the course on a regular basis. <u>Minimum log in for the course is at least four (4) days per week.</u> Additionally, you should not let more than 72 hours pass without logging in.

The Blackboard software used to manage this online course tracks student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course. Accessing this course on a regular basis is extremely important in order to meet the objectives of this course. Ideally, students should daily check the semester schedule, e-mail, and also check for announcements and fellow student discussions. This course is not 100% self-paced—there will be deadlines. You will feel more at ease with the materials if you stay in touch with what is going on. This course is 3 semester credit hours. For this reason, you should set aside a minimum of 6 hours per week to work on this course. One of the very first things you should do is set aside time each week to work on the class. It is very easy to put off attendance in an online course.
