Course Description: This course discusses theories of the firm, value and price determination, and functional distribution, with the application of these theories to problems of particular firms, industries, and markets.

Prerequisite: None. However, its preferred that students have taken or are currently enrolled in MATH 1324.

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Summarize the Law of Diminishing Marginal Utility; describe the process of utility maximization.
- 4. Calculate supply and demand elasticities, identify the determinants of price elasticity of demand and supply, and demonstrate the relationship between elasticity and total revenue.
- 5. Describe the production function and the Law of Diminishing Marginal Productivity; calculate and graph short-run and long-run costs of production.
- 6. Identify the four market structures by characteristics; calculate and graph the profit-maximizing price and quantity in the output markets by the use of marginal analysis.
- 7. Determine the profit-maximizing price and quantity of resources in factor markets under perfect and imperfect competition by use of marginal analysis.
- 8. Describe governmental efforts to address market failures such as monopoly power, externalities, and public goods.
- 9. Identify the benefits of free trade using the concept of comparative advantage.
- 10. Address issues, policies, public opinions, expectations, environmental, and cultural changes that affect industry, society, choices, and the current economic state.

Student Introduction: During the first week, you will introduce yourselves using the discussion tool in blackboard. This allows the professor and other classmates to get to know you. It will be a graded assignment worth 5% of your final grade.

Case Study Discussion: During the course, you complete a Case Study Discussion worth 15% of your final grade. The Case Study Discussion will not open until the second week of class and will be due <u>MIDNIGHT ON AUGUST 2ND</u> (no exceptions). For the Case Study Discussion, you will read a case study related to a topic pertaining to the course and type 3-4 paragraphs answering assigned questions. You are also expected to make at least 2 thoughtful and substantial responses to classmates. A detailed rubric regarding the discussion will be located in Blackboard.

Exams: There are four exams in this course and an optional cumulative final exam. Each of the four exams will be counted as 25% of your final grade (100% total), and the lowest exam can be replaced with the grade of optional cumulative final exam. Because this is a summer course, you can take the four exams at any time before MIDNIGHT ON AUGUST 9TH (no exceptions).

Course Outline: You can find a detailed course outline in blackboard. Because this is a spring interim course, all assignments will be available from the start of the course.

Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first-class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.
