Student Learning Outcomes Assessment:

Dr. Alicia Barr is the faculty member who is responsible for the assessment of the student learning outcomes. She will be sending a list of which SLOs will be assessed for each semester. There are 6 outcomes and these are rotated. Dr. Barr is also the person responsible to entry of the data into Weave for documentation.

Course Evaluation: See the instructor's course information sheet for specific items used in evaluating student performance. However, all courses will have multiple exams and a written assignment that is designated by the instructor.

Attendance Policy: Instructors' attendance policies will be consistent with the *SPC General Catalog* "Class Attendance" policies; <u>specific</u> instructor attendance policies are found in the later part of the syllabus.

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus. When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's

responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

Plagiarism and Cheating: Students are expected to do their own work on all projects, quizzes, assignments, examinations, and papers. Failure to comply with this policy will result in an F for the assignment and can result in an F for the course if circumstances warrant.

Plagiarism violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

How to access SPC Email (and MS Word, Excel, PowerPoint and One Drive)

South Plains College provides all students with a free SPC Google email account. You can access your SPC email (as well as Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint and One Drive for FREE!) by going to https://office.com and using the username and password provided in your SPC acceptance letter to sign in. Or, you can go to the "Instructor Information" folder in Blackboard and click on the "Send email" button to compose your email message. A third way to access email is to log in to MySPC and find your Outlook email. If needed contact the helpdesk@southplainscollege.edu.

REQUIRED TECHNOLOGY & COURSE MATERIALS FOR ONLINE SUCCESS

Blackboard

All course content is found on Blackboard, and most (if not all) of your coursework will be completed on Blackboard. Thus, you need a computer with internet access. You can access Blackboard at https://southplainscollege.blackboard.com. This address will take you to the login page, where you type in your username and password. Once logged in, you will see a list of classes in which you are enrolled (including PSYC2301). Click on the class whose Blackboard page you want to enter.

Noba Project Textbook and Perusall Reading App

The FREE textbook we will use is *Noba Textbook Series: Psychology*, R. Biswas-Diener & E. Diener (Eds), Champaign, IL: DEF Publishers. DOI: nobaproject.com. I have copied each assigned chapter into a reading app that you will use to complete the assignments. *To access the assigned and graded readings in the app*, you must 1) log onto Blackboard and click on PSYC2301 in your "Courses" list, then 2) click on the "Perusall" link that opens the reading app called Perusall (found in each Unit under the "Content" tab). Note: Perusall links are symbolized with a rocket ship icon:

Perusall is a free app that automatically records and grades the work you complete on reading assignments. Again, you will access the Perusall app by *first* logging onto Blackboard, and *second* clicking on Perusall links found in our course. Do NOT log into Perusall from their homepage—if you do, your work will *not* sync into the Blackboard gradebook. You can find detailed information about "How Perusall Works" in the "Start Here" module on Blackboard.

Access to a working computer with a reliable internet connection

Because your graded reading assignments are found on Blackboard and completed online, you must have regular access to a computer with the following characteristics:

- A modern operating system (Windows 7 or later is recommended; most class content should be compatible with Mac
 OS and older versions of Windows, down to XP; Linux operating system is not recommended)
- A modern web browser. It is recommended that students use Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome to access Blackboard. Students have reported more problems using Internet Explorer, thus Internet Explorer is *not* recommended.
 - o Link: download Mozilla Firefox.
 - o Link: download Google Chrome.
- A stable, reliable internet connection. High-speed internet (e.g., Cable, DSL, fiber) is the most reliable.
- It is not required, but it is recommended that you use a computer with a hardwired internet access (e.g., instead of WiFi) especially for Blackboard quizzes and exams. When using WiFi, there is a greater risk of interrupted service.
- The Blackboard app for smartphones can be used to access announcements, readings, videos, podcasts, quizzes, exams and grades on Blackboard.

HOW THIS COURSE IS STRUCTURED

In Blackboard, you will find a "Start Here" folder and 5 Unit folders. You will find the syllabus quiz in the "Start Here" folder. Each Unit folder contains Perusall reading + discussion assignments, videos and/or podcast to watch/listen to, and an occasional activity. The Unit 2 folder also includes the writing assignment submission link. Each Unit ends with a comprehension QUIZ, and an EXAM.

REQUIRED COURSEWORK AND GRADES

Your learning is assessed via: 1) a syllabus quiz, 2) writing assignment, 3) Perusall reading + discussion assignments, 4) comprehension quizzes, and 5) exams.

Syllabus Quiz

- 20 questions, each question worth 1/2 point for a total of 10 points
- You get three attempts; the highest quiz attempt will count toward your final grade.
- 20-minute time limit per attempt, and you are allowed to use your notes or a printout of the syllabus
- The syllabus quiz cannot be made up if missed and late submissions (e.g., submitted at 12:05 am, or 1:17 am, etc.) will not be accepted. DUE by 11:59 pm (just before midnight) Sunday January 19th (1/19).

Writing Assignment

- You will answer 10 questions (some questions have multiple parts) to assess your understanding of research methods in general, and specifically correlational studies and experiments.
- Worth 25 points with deductions for spelling, grammar and punctuation errors.
- DUE by 5 pm Monday February 10th (2/10)

Perusall Reading + Discussion Assignments

- 14 Perusall assignments total; each worth 5 points
- Your 2 lowest Perusall assignment grades will be dropped
- The highest possible point total on your top 12 Perusall assignments X 5 points = 60 points
- This is the main *interactive, social* part of this class. As you read, you post comments and questions that your classmates can read and reply to, and you reply to and/or upvote your classmates' comments and questions.
- Perusall points are based on 1) quality *and* quantity of your comments/questions, 2) how much you upvote &/or reply to your classmates' posts, 3) how much classmates reply to &/or upvote your posts, 4) active time spent on the assignment, and 5) reading (and posting annotations) throughout the entire chapter (as opposed to just one section)
- Because I drop your 2 lowest Perusall grades, these assignments cannot be made up if missed. Work that is submitted up to one hour late will only receive partial credit. No credit will be given for an assignment that is worked on more than 1 hour after the due date and time.

Five Comprehension Quizzes

- 5 weekly guizzes total; 15 guestions on each guiz; each guiz worth 15 points
- For each quiz, you get three attempts; the highest quiz attempt will count toward your final grade.
- I drop your lowest quiz grade.
- The highest possible point total on your top 4 quizzes = 60 points
- Each quiz has 15 multiple choice questions based on readings *and videos* for the week. Note: the 15 questions on the quiz are *randomly drawn* from a set of 35-40 questions, so questions for your first attempt will *not* be identical to questions on your second or third attempt.
- 15-minute time limit, per attempt
- Because I drop your lowest quiz grade *and* you get three attempts on each quiz, quizzes cannot be made up if missed and late submissions (e.g., a quiz that is submitted at 12:01 am, or 1:17 am, etc.) will not be accepted.

Five Exams (four within-semester Exams + one Final Exam)

- There are five exams, each worth 100 points, containing 40-50 multiple choice questions.
- Exams are proctored using Honorlock. This means that students are recorded as they complete the exam to ensure academic integrity.
- You get one attempt on exams.
- For Exams #1 through #4, your lowest exam grade will be dropped, and the top three count toward your final grade.
- The Final Exam focuses on the material from Unit 5, but includes some information from previous sections, thus it is a semi-comprehensive final exam.
- Your top 3 within-semester exams, plus the final exam, are worth 400 points.
- Exams cannot be made up if missed, and late submissions will not be accepted. If you miss one of the first four exams, the zero on the missed exam will become your drop grade. The Final Exam is mandatory and cannot be missed without having a significant negative impact on your final grade. The only excepted excuse for missing the Final Exam is an extreme illness, or hospitalization, death of a loved one within a week of the exam. To be granted a make-up, these excuses require verification (e.g., a doctor's note, hospital papers with your name and date, etc.).

Grade Inquiries

If you have a question about a grade in the gradebook, you must contact me within one week of the assignment due date. Otherwise, the grade in the gradebook is final.

POLICIES RE: LATE WORK OR MISSING WORK

If you are a high school student taking this class for dual credit, please note that my due dates are enforced. Participation in sports and other extracurricular activities will not be accepted as valid excuses for not completing work by the due date. Part of what you learn as a dual credit student is time management. Please take this opportunity to become more cognizant and responsible of your various commitments.

Due dates for all work are found in this syllabus, and multiple locations on Blackboard. I have done my job of posting all due dates and times for graded work—it is now your job to complete them on time.

NOTE: The only computer issue that warrants a make-up is if the entire class is unable to access Blackboard at the time a Perusall assignment, quiz or exam is due. If this occurs, I will extend the due date for the entire class. Because other

computer issues are not an excepted reason for a make-up, you should carefully read about how to prevent and deal with technology problems in the sections following this one.

Missed Perusall Reading Assignments

Because I drop everyone's two lowest Perusall assignment grades, these cannot be made up if missed, regardless of the reason for missing the assignment. I drop the two lowest grades to account for the possibility that a student is too sick to complete an assignment or has an emergency that requires their time and attention. Perusall reading assignments are available for at least 1 week prior to their due date. If you know you are going to have a busy week due to school + work + life, please work ahead.

Missed Comprehension Quiz

Because I drop everyone's lowest quiz grade and students get three attempts on each quiz, these cannot be made up if a student misses the due date or submits a quiz late. Do your best to manage your time and keep up with the class calendar.

Missed Exam

Because I drop everyone's lowest exam grade out of the first four exams, these cannot be made up if a student misses a due date or submits an exam late. This drop grade is your safety net—it is there in case something out of your control happens and forces you to miss an exam, or you underprepare for an exam. Please use this safety net wisely!

The Final Exam is mandatory and cannot be missed without having a significant negative impact on your final grade. The only excepted excuse for missing the Final Exam is an extreme illness, or hospitalization, death of a loved one within a week of the exam. To be granted a make-up, these excuses require verification (e.g., a doctor's note, hospital papers with your name and date, etc.).

Attendance and Drop Policy: For online students, I will take "attendance" based on your completion of graded work by the due date, and logging into Blackboard. A student *may* be dropped from this course if 1) the student has not logged on to Blackboard for 5+ consecutive days, <u>or</u> 2) the student has not logged onto Blackboard *or* completed any work by the 5th day of classes, <u>or</u> 3) the student has too much incomplete work to pass the course.

In most cases, students manage their destiny in my class. If you feel that you are struggling and might not pass my class, please contact me and we can discuss your grade average. Based on our discussion, it is up to you to decide whether you want to remain enrolled or drop the course. However, do not expect me to read your mind, or automatically interpret missing work or not logging on as a desire or request to be dropped. If you choose to *not* complete the course, it is your responsibility to drop the course by contacting the registrar.

Perusall Expectations

While I do not expect students to agree on every topic that is discussed in Perusall assignments, I DO expect students to communicate with one another, and with me, in a respectful manner. In other words, it is possible for people to disagree with one another and simultaneously speak or write in a pleasant manner—focusing on explaining your point of view and understanding a classmate's point of view, rather than "winning" a debate. If you have any concerns about how classmates are discussing material with each other or with you, please contact me ASAP.
