Required Materials: <u>Arriba-Comunicación y Cultura.</u> 7th Edition (Textbook or e-book format via MySpanishLab) <u>MySpanishLab</u> (online component—purchase access) — **Course ID**: williams26756

Course Description: <u>SPAN 2311</u>. This course emphasizes the consolidation of skills acquired at the introductory level. Further development of proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing. Emphasis on comprehension, appreciation, and interpretation of the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. Semester Hours: 3; Lecture Hours: 2; Lab Hours: 3. Prerequisite: SPAN 1412 or Equivalent with a "C" or better.

Additional Information: This course is founded on interaction, communication, and culture and is geared at improving all aspects of Spanish language-speaking, listening, reading, writing and knowledge of Hispanic cultures. Strong emphasis will be placed on reading, writing, and speaking the language. You will exchange real-life information about yourself in a variety of activities. You will continue to acquire and improve upon your aural comprehension by listening to me and others speak, and by listening and responding to the comprehension exercises in MySpanishLab (MSL), as well as any additional materials presented online. It is recommended that you spend time outside of class exposing yourself to the Spanish language by watching Spanish-speaking programs, listening to Spanish radio stations, choosing print materials of personal interest that are in Spanish, and engaging in interactions with others that speak the language. It is always important to understand the basic principles of grammar in order to become more proficient, and this will require that you learn said principles and rules, which will be discussed in English. In learning such an array of communication skills you must diligently practice and strive for improvement. It is impossible to "cram" for a language class and expect satisfactory results as communicative competence is built gradually over a period of time. You will be given ample resources to help you succeed and you will be held to high expectations in all aspects of this course. Having and maintaining an active email account as well as online access will be essential for this course. Please note campus computer lab locations and times.

Assignments: Assignments are to be prepared before their due date. All assignments will be due at 11:59pm on the date they are assigned. Most assignments will be due on Fridays for this course. Assignments will include readings and textbook exercises (oral and written/typed), the MySpanishLab assignments and any other activities designed to stimulate and reinforce foreign language acquisition. On average you should study and work on materials for this course for an amount of time equal to that you would spend in an in-person class. Assignments will not be accepted incomplete or late.

<u>Please note that in this class, utilizing translation websites for written assignments in Spanish will not be allowed and will infringe upon the guidelines of academic integrity.</u>

MySpanishLab calendar assignments are structured as follows (using Chrome as your browser):

SAM activities: These Student Activity Manual exercises (SAM) will be the majority of your online assignments on the calendar. You will be able to work these exercises 3 times AFTER looking at the corresponding textbook pages. You should use the feedback bubble to see any hints or, after your second attempt, the correct answer that will be given. So, your third submission should be 100% correct. If you make a 100 on your second attempt, you should "try again" and submit it a 3rd time. This will help your average on the exercise. It is important that you self-evaluate and learn from your mistakes on these exercises. These are not exams; they are homework so you should be utilizing your textbook and notes to complete them (be prepared before you start).

TXT activities: These activities are identical to the ones listed in your textbook on the pages indicated. These can be worked up to 100X and your highest grade will be taken. These tend to be more reading intense so take your time and make the extra effort to look up what's being said.

Extra Practice activities: These activities are usually assigned toward the end of the chapter. They are not optional practice as they weigh the same as other grades so don't be fooled by the title. These test your essential grammar for the chapter. These can be worked up to 100X and your highest grade will be taken.

Practice Test: Depending on the test format, these may be assigned prior to a given exam. These can be worked up to 100X and your highest grade will be taken. You should check the feedback bubble after your 1st attempt and look at your mistakes and possible hints.

Grammar and Vocabulary Tutorials: These are ALWAYS available in the tutorials tab. I suggest spending 30 minutes a day with them. I will purposely assign some on the calendar, but you can always access them from the top of the page.

Tests: These will be posted on designated test days. They will be timed, and all questions must be answered. You will have one attempt. They will cover all forms of grammar and vocabulary from the chapter. You will have Listening, Reading, and Writing sections in multiple formats (true/false, fill in the blank, multiple choice, word banks, and short sentence answers).

*A grade of 'C' or better is required in order to continue to the next level of Spanish at SPC. The next course is SPAN 2312.

Assignments and MySpanishLab: This class includes a 3-hour weekly lab obligation in addition to class meetings and discussions. This means that you must log in weekly and successfully complete the assigned activities and exercises in order to pass the course. You are to remain above 80% completion of all assigned exercises at any given time. Students not meeting this requirement will receive one warning in writing. Failure to meet requirements will result in the student being dropped from the course (see Special Notice section below).

Missed assignments: There will be no make-up work, quizzes, nor make-up exams. In addition to the campus safety plan, I encourage you to let me know if you fall ill during the course of the semester, a family emergency, or find yourself with an approved school activity that impedes with pending MSL assignments (not past due). I will, at my discretion and within reason, work with you. I would expect these occurrences to be rare.

Written Exams: Written exams will consist of timed evaluations over the textbook chapter material/readings. Format will vary but will be completed on MySpanishLab. You are not allowed to access any materials or 3rd party sources for completing exams unless instructed otherwise.

Final Exam: Every student must take the comprehensive Final Exam. Specific date and format to be determined.

Special Notice: If at any time you decide to quit attending class it is your responsibility to follow the appropriate procedures and drop the course. I strongly encourage you to visit with your professor before dropping any course. The last day to drop the course is **Thursday, April 25th**. If you have not logged into the MSL, maintained an 80% completion of all posted exercises after being warned, expect to be dropped from the course by the instructor.

Academic Integrity: Cheating and plagiarism constitute serious offenses and will not be tolerated. (Refer to the SPC General Catalog and Student Guide). For this class, the use of online translators/websites for written assignments is considered cheating.

4. Write evaluations and critiques at a high intermediate level using complex grammatical structures.

5. Formulate cohesive paragraphs and essays.

6. Interpret cultural practices and products of the Spanish speaking world drawing on authentic materials including literature and the visual arts.
