Course Description:

This course is a continuation of English 1301 which includes an introduction to literature and collateral readings. It also teaches students how to write a college-level research paper.

Scope/Purpose:

English 1302 continues the purpose of English 1301: to help students think well by helping them to write well. Unlike English 1301, English 1302 has a two-fold purpose: it encourages critical writing by introducing students to research and writing about literature from sources, and it introduces students to imaginative literature, to the modes of artistic thought, and to the critical responses appropriate to these modes of thought.

Course Goals/Objectives:

By the end of English 1302, the student should have written papers that reflect the following:

- 1. Critical Thinking and Problem Solving:
 - Use of proper audience, purpose, and subject for a writing assignment
 - Choice of an appropriate topic, tone, and style
 - Development of essays that are appropriate in logic, structure, focus, and coherence
 - Application of logic to create strong, concrete, and developed arguments
 - Analysis of essays and application of constructive suggestions as a result of peer editing or instructor comments
 - Revision of structural, developmental, grammatical, and mechanical problems within an essay
 - Ability to analyze literature
 - Ability to write a single source paper or analytical literary paper
 - Ability to evaluate sources
 - Ability to properly document sources within a paper
 - Ability to do a works cited
- 2. Creativity:
 - Topic choice; diction, tone, and style; analysis and paper development
 - Group work and class discussions
 - Literary analysis
 - Research topic analysis
 - Research sources analysis
- 3. Communication/Collaboration:
 - The writing assignments themselves, as the ultimate goal of the course is to teach students to communicate effectively through writing
 - Teacher/student interaction, both in class discussions and in one-on-one help with papers
 - Interaction with other students in class discussions, group work, and peer editing
- 4. Leadership, Personal Responsibility, Honesty, and Integrity:
 - Regular and on-time class attendance
 - Responsibility for the learning process, including preparation for class, such as reading and homework; participation in class discussions, including asking relevant questions; getting assignments and/or notes if absent; and accepting responsibility for not understanding an assignment or failing an assignment
 - Submission of all assignments in accordance with due dates
 - Avoidance of all forms of cheating and plagiarism on all assignments, including improper collaboration
 - Respectful behavior toward instructor and classmates in order to contribute to the atmosphere necessary for learning

Course Requirements:

- Students will read numerous short stories, poems, and plays; will participate in class discussions of the readings; and will be tested over their understanding of the readings and lectures through quizzes, examinations, and/or written assignments.
- 2. Students will complete one or more written assignments which may include, but not be limited to, one multi-source research paper, two or more shorter papers (summary, synthesis, critique, explication) or a series of research questions or projects.
- 3. Major examinations will be given over the assigned readings and films.
- 4. The Writing Process must be followed for all writing for the class.

Methods of Evaluation:

Students' work will be evaluated by letter grades of A, B, C, D, or F: Superior, Good, Average, Poor, or Unacceptable. Numerical grades are assigned for averaging grades only. All assignments must be completed and turned in on the date due before students are eligible to pass the class. **Essays and writing assignments will be evaluated by the following:**

- 1. Accuracy of content;
- 2. Use of the conventions of standard grammar; major grammatical errors include sentence fragments, comma splices, run-on/fused sentences, subject/verb agreement errors, pronoun/antecedent agreement, and misspelled words (three misspelled words equals one major error).
- 3. Use of appropriate method of development for the assignment;
- 4. Use of the principles of unity and coherence; and
- 5. Use of logical, factual arguments to develop and advance the thesis of the assignment.

Literary Paper Peer Editing:

*<u>students who don't have a completed Rough Draft by 20 minutes into the period will not be allowed</u> to Peer Edit--with no exceptions.

*do not write on other people's Rough Drafts;

*answer the questions on the editing sheets;

*circle any problems that you see on other people's drafts;

*spell out all words on the editing sheets, even "yes" and "no".

Late Work:

*No late work will be accepted after the last day of regular class, whether papers or makeup exams.
*No late Research Papers will be accepted after the due date unless prior arrangements are made with me.

*Daily reading quizzes can't be made up; quizzes over videos can be made up.

Attendance Policy:

This class will be taught workshop style, so attendance is critical. In order to participate in each day's activities, students must be present. Students who miss half the period will be counted absent. Students with more than two absences (300 minutes of class) don't meet the minimum standards of the class and will be dropped. Students who are borderline (59,69,79,89) at the end of the semester will be moved up a letter grade if they have 1 or 0 absences. Students who are 5 or more minutes late will be counted absent each time after the second time.

Plagiarism and Cheating:

Complete honesty is required in all course work. Matters of plagiarism and cheating will be handled by the instructor and, if necessary, in consultation with the department chairperson. Depending on the severity of the problem, instructors may assign penalties from zero for the assignment to an "F" in the course. Extreme cases may result in expulsion from the college.

*Heading: should be double spaced and put in the top left corner of the first page only: Your Name Prof. McClellan English 1302-Section Number Paper Due Date

*Page Numbers: put your last name and the page number in the top right corner of all pages

*Handwritten: *Ink: use blue or black ink only *Readability: make sure the paper is legible *Title: *don't change the font size, *write in all capitals, *underline it, *bold it, or *put quotation marks around it *The Paper Itself: *don't write in all capital letters *don't skip lines between paragraphs *don't have ragged edges

*Computer Written/Typed:

*Font: Use Courier New #12 only

*Spacing: double space throughout the paper, even in the heading

*Margins: have a one inch margin all around the page

*Title: <u>don't</u>: *put it in all capital letters

*put it in bold *change the font size *underline it or *put it in quotation marks
