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This course satisfies the Foundational Component in Creative Arts.

Catalog Description

Survey of all phases of theater including its history, dramatic works, stage techniques, production procedures, and relation to the fine arts. Participation in major productions may be required.

Objectives

Demonstrate critical thinking about theatre through written responses to play texts and/or live performance.

Demonstrate a general knowledge of theatre history and dramatic works.

Demonstrate an understanding of the collaborative nature of theatre art and the many jobs required to develop a theatre production.

Demonstrate the relationship of theatre to society and the human condition as it relates to the student's perspective.

Course Structure

This is a fully online section – as such you must have access to a computer and secure internet connection. Deadlines missed because of computer issues will not be overlooked or adjusted. By taking a fully online class you are expected to have the technological capability. There will be new material presented every week.

Attendance

WARNING: After 3 weeks of non-participating (signing on to blackboard) you will be dropped from the class! You are responsible for maintaining work/life balance and completing the class..The only excuses would be if you are hospitalized.

Textbook: None – this means you need to listen to the lecture powerpoints and you should take notes. No textbook means you have to use the resources to gain the information.

Evaluation:

There is no such thing as a class average in this class – you have a series of tasks and each task has a possible point value, your job is to gain points, then at the end of the semester I will add the points and your grade will be based on the following scale:

Points will accrue in the following categories:

The material is divided up into 3 sections, each section contains the following:

There will be tests every two weeks, it is a short test over those weeks material, Due on Saturdays at midnight—total possible for the class 600.

Weekly questions – every 2 weeks there will be a short question discussion question, it is a short answer that you will post– total possible for class 600

Section test – I will take the weekly tests and pull questions from them and you will have a test worth 150 points – total possible for class 450

There will be a final exam open during finals week worth a possible 200 points

You will need to watch a performance of a live play (no you cannot watch a play online, that is not "live" theatre) the critique is due by the end of the semester and is worth 150 points. You can do a total of two for a possible 300 points

Each week will have a vocabulary list, there will be a quiz weekly over the terms, each week the vocabulary assignment will close on Saturday, total possible points 140

There is a total possible of 2290 points so you can make your choices as to what you do in the class, but realize that there is NO extra credit, and after deadlines have past they will not be reopened, so don't wait to start gathering points. Remember you start at 0 and work your way up.

WARNING – Cheating or plagiarism will result in the student receiving a 0 on the assignment for the first offense, second offence you will be dropped from the class.

Artificial Intelligence Statement

· Purpose of Artificial Intelligence (AI) Applications:

AI applications such as ChatGPT, OpenAI, Bard, Grammarly, WordTune and others are advanced language models designed to aid and engage in meaningful conversations, as well as, generate and revise content. AI is intended to supplement learning, stimulate critical thinking, and enhance academic discourse. However, its use comes with certain responsibilities.

· Academic Integrity:

Using AI to generate academic work, including essays, reports, or assignments, without proper attribution is a violation of SPC academic integrity policies. Plagiarism undermines the learning process and is strictly prohibited. Students must ensure that their work reflects their own ideas, research, synthesis, and analysis and appropriately cites all sources, including AI.

· Collaboration and Consultation:

While AI can be a valuable resource, it is essential to strike a balance between seeking assistance and maintaining personal responsibility. Collaboration with peers, consulting instructors, and utilizing other approved learning resources should be prioritized. Overreliance on AI for solutions without actively engaging in the learning process is discouraged and can be grounds for academic integrity violations. Utilizing AI as a tool for brainstorming or research is allowed but the writing should be the student's own work and thoughts.

· Critical Thinking and Originality:

AI usage can provide suggestions and information, but it is essential to critically evaluate the responses and exercise independent thought. Relying solely on AI for answers deprives students of the opportunity to develop their analytical and problem-solving skills. In assignments where originality, creativity, and independent thinking are valued, AI would be detrimental to the student learning process. Critical thinking and originality emphasize the importance of independent

thinking in all academic endeavors as part of the student's learning experience apart from outside influence and offers the student the opportunity to refine their unique, individual voice through academic discourse with other students and faculty.

· Ethical Use and Bias Awareness:

AI is trained on large amounts of data from the internet, which may include biased or inaccurate information. Be mindful of the potential for bias and critically evaluate the responses provided by AI. Therefore, when using AI, just like with using any other database, students must verify that the information is from reliable sources, question any potential biases, and ensure that the information and sources used in the paper are neutral, peer-reviewed sources.

· Responsible Engagement:

Students should engage with AI in a respectful and responsible manner and avoid using offensive language, discriminatory remarks, or engaging in any form of harassment or inappropriate behavior. Students should also uphold the standards of respectful communication in addressing both AI and fellow classmates.

· Compliance with South Plains College Policies:

Policies regarding the appropriate use of AI in South Plains College courses are set by instructional departments and individual instructors. Appropriate use of AI may range from strict prohibition to assignments they may require the use of AI. Misusing or violating the guidelines outlined in this syllabus warning may result in disciplinary action, including academic penalties.
