Course Title: Foundations of Mathematical Reasoning

Course Description: This course surveys a variety of mathematical topics needed to prepare students for college level statistics, or quantitative reasoning, or for algebra-based courses. Topics include: numeracy with an emphasis on estimation and fluency with large numbers; evaluating expressions and formulas; rates, ratios, and proportions; percentages; solving equations; linear models; data interpretations including graphs and tables; verbal, algebraic, and graphical representations of functions; exponential models. This course carries institutional credit but will not transfer and will not be used to meet degree requirements. This course will not satisfy graduation requirements.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course and receiving a passing grade, the student will be able to:

- Numeracy: Students will develop number sense and the ability to apply concepts of numeracy to investigate and describe quantitative relationships and solve real-world problems in a variety of contexts.
- 2. **Proportional Reasoning**: Students will use proportional reasoning to solve problems that require ratios, rates, proportions, and scaling.
- 3. **Algebraic Competence, Reasoning, and Modeling**: Students will transition from specific and numeric to general and abstract reasoning using the language and structure of algebra to investigate, represent, and solve problems.
- 4. **Assessing Risk (Probabilistic Reasoning):** Students will understand and critically evaluate statements involving risk and arguments based on probability that appear in the popular media, especially in presenting medical information.
- 5. **Personal Finance**: Students will understand, interpret and make decisions based on financial information that is commonly presented to consumers.

6. **Civic Life**: Students will understand that quantitative information presented in the media and by other entities can sometimes be useful and sometimes be misleading.

Course Evaluation: There will be a comprehensive departmental final exam given by all instructors.
