Course Description: Limits and continuity; the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus; definition of the derivative of a function and techniques of differentiation; applications of the derivative to maximizing or minimizing a function; the chain rule, mean value theorem, and rate of change problems; curve sketching; definite and indefinite integration of algebraic, trigonometric, and transcendental functions, with an application to calculation of areas.

Prerequisite: Successful completion with a grade of 'C' or better in MATH 2412 (Pre-calculus) or successful completion with a grade of 'C' or better in MATH 1314 (College Algebra) and MATH 1316 (Trigonometry).

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course and receiving a passing grade, the student will be able to:

- 1. Develop solutions for tangent and area problems using the concepts of limits, derivatives, and integrals.
- 2. Draw graphs of algebraic and transcendental functions considering limits, continuity, and differentiability at a point.
- 3. Determine whether a function is continuous and/or differentiable at a point using limits.
- 4. Use differentiation rules to differentiate algebraic and transcendental functions.
- 5. Identify appropriate calculus concepts and techniques to provide mathematical models of real-world situations and determine solutions to applied problems.
- 6. Evaluate definite integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus.
- 7. Articulate the relationship between derivatives and integrals using the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus.

Student Learning Outcomes Assessment: Pre- and post-test exercises will be used to determine the extent of improvement that the students have gained during the semester.

Course Evaluation: There will be a cumulative final exam at the end of this course. Assignments and quizzes will count for 25% of the final grade, while exams count for 75% of the final grade. Expect 19 assignments, approximately 11 quizzes, and 3 scheduled exams throughout the course. Your final average in the course will determine the letter grade posted on your transcript. This grade is determined by the following scale: A (90-100%), B (80-89%), C (70-79%), D (60-69%), F (0-59%).

- Assignments/Quizzes (19 assignments and approximately 11 quizzes) = 25%
- Exam 1 (covering Assignments 1-9) = 25%
- Exam 2 (covering Assignments 10-15) = 25%
- Exam 3 (cumulative final exam also covering Assignments 16-19) = 25%
