- Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirements for teacher certification.
- Course Purpose: Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the US Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas.

GOVERNMENT 2305 GENERAL OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSE

Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the history, theory, and evolution of American democracy through a survey of the institutions and processes that comprise it. Theories, models, and observation will be utilized to demonstrate the scientific study of political phenomena. Further, the course meets statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Explain the origin and development of constitutional democracy in the United States.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of our federal system.
- 3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the federal government.
- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties.
- 6. Analyze the election process.
- 7. Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues and policies in U.S. Politics.

GRADING AND COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Three major exams will be conducted during the semester. Exams will adhere to the format outlined by the instructor. The first two major exams will be worth 100 points each and the last exam (taken the final lecture week of the semester) will count as 50 points. Failure to take the last exam will result in the grade of "F" for the course. Each exam will contain a "critical thinking" writing component.

2. Two Reading Exams will be administered during the course of the semester. Each reading exam will count as 25 points for a total of 50 points. <u>Absolutely no make-ups</u> on reading exams! Failure to take the reading exam on the scheduled day and time will result in the grade of "0" for that particular exam. <u>There are no exceptions to this policy.</u>
