GOVT 2305: Federal Government Department of Social Sciences South Plains College

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Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirement for teacher certification.

Credit: 3 lecture hours

Prerequisites: TSI compliance in reading

Course Purpose: Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint learners with the origin and development of the U.S. Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas. Approval Number 45.1002.51.25

Course Requirements: To maximize a student's potential to complete this course, he/she should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the instructor's specific instructions.

 - c. Accepting personal responsibility for decisions and actions taken or not taken

Exams: There will be three exams in this course. Exams will consist of multiple choice questions and possibly a few true/false or short answer questions. The Final Exam is not cumulative but only covers the course content discussed after Exam 2. The exam must be completed in one sitting and you will only have one attempt to complete each exam.

Makeup Exam: If you are unable to complete an exam because of a technical issue (your internet went out, the exam auto-submitted, etc.) or if you have a valid excuse for missing the exam (as determined by the professor) then you may take the makeup exam located in the

"Makeup Exam" folder. You must receive permission to take the makeup exam BEFORE you take it. The makeup exam will be similar standard exam but in addition to multiple choice questions you will also be required to complete short answer and/or essay responses.

Essays: You will complete two essays. The essay topic will be relevant to the week in which the essay is assigned.

Discussion Posts: You will complete four discussion post assignments in selected weeks. The content assigned to the appropriate week will be sufficient to allow you to successfully submit your discussion post. In addition to your discussion post you will need to respond to a minimum of 2 other posts by other students.

Quizzes: In some weeks you will be asked to complete a quiz over the content covered in that week. The quiz will be multiple choice. You will have one attempt to complete a quiz.

Plagiarism and Cheating: Plagiarism and cheating in any form will not be tolerated in this course. South Plains College provides for a wide range of punishments for cheating including failing the assignment, quiz, exam, or course. I will be vigilant against cheating and you will at a minimum fail the assignment, quiz, or exam in which cheating or plagiarism has occurred.

Late Work: Late work will not be accepted. If you are sick and cannot complete your work or if you have another legitimate excuse (as determined by the professor) please email me so that we can make the appropriate arrangements for the completion of your coursework.

Extra Credit: There will likely not be opportunities for extra credit. If extra credit is available it will be available to the entire class. Do not ask for extra credit opportunities.
