Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirement for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and intergovernmental relations, political participation, the electoral process, public policy, and the political structure of Texas. Exams: There will be four exams in this course. Each exam will be worth 20% of your total grade. Each exam will be composed primarily of multiple-choice and fill-in-the-blank questions, but there will likely be true/false questions. You will be informed before the exam if short answer or essay questions are used in the exam. If a short answer or essay question is used it will compose no more than 50 percent of the exams grade.

Attendance Policy: You are required to regularly attend class and I will take roll at the beginning of each class. Attendance will account for 20 percent of your total grade. Your attendance grade will be calculated by dividing the number of days you have attended by the number of class days held throughout the semester. If you are sick or attending an SPC-sponsored event please email me so that I can mark you as excused. This is important so that I am know you are not simply skipping class and your grade is not penalized.
