Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirement for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and intergovernmental relations, political participation, the electoral process, public policy, and the political structure of Texas. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas.

Exams: There will be four exams in this course. Each exam will be worth 15% of your total grade. Each exam will be composed primarily of multiple-choice questions, but there will likely be true/false questions and fill-in-the-blank questions. You will be informed if short answer or essay questions are used in the exam. If I use short answer or essay questions then that portion of the exam will compose no more than 50 percent of the exam's grade.

Quizzes: You will complete 11 quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will cover the content found within the folder where the quiz is located. Make sure that you read and/or watch all materials provided in the folder before beginning your quiz. Each quiz will be worth 2 percentage points each. Each quiz will be composed of 5 to 20 questions. The questions in the quiz will be multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, and, or, True/False questions. The Syllabus Quiz will also be graded but you will be permitted to re-take the syllabus quiz until you receive full points.

Discussion Posts: You will complete 4 discussion post assignments throughout this semester. Each discussion post assignment will cover a topic addressed within the weekly folder where the discussion post is located. To complete the discussion post assignment you will need to post a discussion addressing the question I post to you and the class. You will need to respond to that question in roughly 300 to 400 words (a word count function exists on the bottom left corner of Microsoft Word). However, you should write more than 400 words if you need to. It is always better to write more and fully answer the question than to write too little and leave important details out of your discussion.

You will also need to respond to at least 2 discussion posts by other students. You may respond twice to the same student or respond once to two different students. To make a response post hit the "Reply" button at the bottom of their discussion post. Each response post should be roughly 150 words, but once again write more if you need to.

<u>The discussion post assignment will have two due dates</u>. You will be required to submit your first discussion post on one day (which will be assigned in the appropriate folder) and then you will be required to post your two response posts on a different day as assigned in the appropriate weekly folder.
