Course Description: This course is a study of the functions performed in the American system of state governments, with special reference to the development of governance in Texas and its Constitutions. This course satisfies the Legislative requirements for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

## GOVERNMENT 2306 GENERAL OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSE

The course meets statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

# GRADING AND COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Three major exams (which include the final exam) will be conducted during the semester. Exams will adhere to the format outlined by the instructor. The first two major exams will be worth 100 points each and the last exam (taken the final week of the semester) will count as 50 points. Failure to take the last exam will result in the grade of "F" for the course. Each exam will contain a "critical thinking" writing component.
- 2. Two Reading Exams will be administered during the course of the semester. Each reading exam will count as 25 points for a total of 50 points. **Absolutely no make-ups on reading exams!** Failure to take the reading exam on the scheduled day and time will result in the grade of "0" for that particular exam. There are no exceptions to this policy.

# ATTENDANCE POLICY (Read Carefully!)

Missing the two major exams is strongly discouraged. A student will only be allowed to take a make-up exam if he/she has a legitimate excuse for missing the major exam. The only two legitimate excuses recognized by the instructor are sickness and a death in the family. The student must present the instructor a doctor's note to prove sickness; or provide an obituary concerning a death in the family. Otherwise, the student will receive a "0" for that particular exam. There are <u>NO EXCEPTIONS</u> to this policy.
