Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirements for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the US Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas.

<u>Course Structure</u>: This course will include videos, assigned supplemental readings, assignments, and tests. All materials, including the class required textbook, will be accessible through Blackboard, or provided in class.

Attendance: Regular attendance is mandatory; attendance will be taken each class. It is in **your best interest** to attend class regularly and on time. Material that will be covered in class goes beyond the assigned reading and many questions that will be on exams come exclusively from lectures rather than just the book. If you miss a class, **you and you alone** are responsible for finding out what you missed from a classmate buddy or from what is posted on Blackboard. I do not repeat lectures in office hours or provide PowerPoints online. An absence is defined as failing to attend class, missing 15 or more minutes of class, or leaving class without the instructor's approval. Additionally, a student accrues an absence each time he or she accumulates a total of three late arrivals (i.e. 5+ minutes late). Whenever feasible, students should let the instructor know about expected absences as soon as possible.

Students who have approved absences for athletic or other school approved activities should provide a schedule within the first two weeks. Students who miss classes or exams due to verifiable circumstances such as medical emergencies should provide the documentation to the professor or facilitator as soon as they return to classes.

<u>Student Performance</u>: You must maintain your standards throughout the duration of the semester. There will be no extra credit and there will be little time for playing "catch-up." **If you fail three (3) consecutive assignments or quizzes, you may be dropped from the class with a failing grade with no further warning.** If you repeatedly fail to submit required work on time, you may be dropped from the class at the discretion of the instructor. **You must complete Quiz 1 by the census date or you will be automatically dropped.**

Quizzes: The instructor will administer **14** quizzes over materials. Should a student miss a reading quiz deadline they will not be allowed to make-up the quiz without instructor approval. You will be allowed up to **TWO** attempts for each quiz for the **average grade** of your attempts (you do not have to take quizzes twice, but this will prevent those who might wish to "preview" questions rather than properly preparing).

Assignments: There will be a reasonable amount of assignments in this class (not all will require the same amount of effort). These assignments are designed to expand student understanding and knowledge. Late assignments will receive deductions of 10 points each day late and will not be accepted after 5 days. Remember that individual assignments will have a greater impact on your grade than missing a single quiz. It would always be best to complete all assignments rather than attempt to offset a zero in this category of evaluation. Please be advised, depending on the length of an assignment, it may take between 1-2 weeks to grade. If you have any questions, please just send an email to me.

Discussion Threads: Every semester I create a discussion thread to discuss current events related to government. Carefully read the handout (on blackboard) detailing discussions and how to receive full credit. Discussions consist of an initial post of 500 words (including at least two outside sources) as well as two fully developed 150-word responses to two different classmates. As with assignments, an automatic deduction of **10 points will be assessed each day late and will not be accepted after 5 days.**

Exams: There will be three exams including the final exam project. Exams will consist of both multiple-choice questions and short answers. "Make-up" exams will be allowed with prior notification, but may require documentation. Students wishing to take a make-up exam must apply to the instructor via email. There will be no "make-ups" for the FINAL EXAM PROJECT due to time constraints.

Tentative Course Schedule for Pacing

The instructor reserves the right to make changes to this schedule including adding readings and assignments. The instructor will endeavor to give you as much advanced notice as possible for any changes. It is best practice to read at least one chapter a week. Reading is required and essential for success in this class.
