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Course Description: This course is a survey of fundamental principles of political science, including the American system of government and the origins and development of the constitutions of the United States. This course satisfies the Legislative requirement for teacher certification.

Credit: 3 lecture hours

Prerequisites: TSI compliance in reading

Course Purpose: Government 2305, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint learners with the origin and development of the U.S. Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the State of Texas. Approval Number 45.1002.51.25

Course Requirements: To maximize a student's potential to complete this course, he/she should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the instructor's specific instructions.

 - c. Accepting personal responsibility for decisions and actions taken or not taken.

Exams: There will be five exams in this course which will be completed at the end of each week. Each exam will be worth 10% of your total grade. Each exam will be composed primarily of multiple-choice questions, but there will likely be true/false questions. You will be informed if short answer or essay questions are used in the exam.

Do not click on the exam until you are ready to begin it. The exam will begin once you have clicked on its link and you must complete the exam at that time. You will have one attempt to complete each exam. The exam will only present one question at a time. You must answer the questions in the order in which they are presented to you. You cannot return to a question once you have answered it or skipped it. Do not click on another browser, window, or tab while

you are completing the quiz. Clicking on another browser, window, or tab while completing the exam may cause Blackboard to auto-submit the exam before you have completed it.

If the exam contains essay questions you will complete the question(s) in a document and you will attach it to the appropriate link. Further details will be provided in the case that an essay exam is used.

Syllabus Quiz: You will complete one quiz this semester and it will cover the Syllabus. You will have an unlimited number of attempts to complete this quiz so I expect everyone to earn full points on this assignment. The purpose of this quiz is to ensure that you have read the syllabus and understand how this course will be conducted.

Discussion Posts: You will complete 4 discussion post assignments throughout this semester. Each discussion post assignment will cover a topic addressed within the weekly folder where the discussion post is located. To complete the discussion post assignment you will need to post a discussion addressing the question I post to you and the class. You will need to respond to that question in roughly 300 to 400 words (a word count function exists on the bottom left corner of Microsoft Word). However, you should write more than 400 words if you need to. It is always better to write more and fully answer the question than to write too little and leave important details out of your discussion.

You will also need to respond to at least 2 discussion posts by other students. You may respond twice to the same student or respond once to two different students. To make a response post hit the "Reply" button at the bottom of their discussion post. Each response post should be roughly 150 words, but once again write more if you need to.

The discussion post assignment will have two due dates. You will be required to submit your first discussion post on one day (which will be assigned in the appropriate folder) and then you will be required to post your two response posts on a different day as assigned in the appropriate weekly folder.

Plagiarism and Cheating: Plagiarism and cheating in any form will not be tolerated in this course. South Plains College provides for a wide range of punishments for cheating including failing the assignment, quiz, exam, or course. I will be vigilant against cheating and you will at a minimum fail the assignment, quiz, or exam in which cheating or plagiarism has occurred.

Late Work: late work will not be accepted. If you are sick and cannot complete your assignments or if you have any other legitimate excuse (as determined by the professor) email me.

Makeup Exams: The instructor may require you to complete an essay exam in lieu of the multiple-choice exam if you are unable to complete the exam in a single attempt.

Extra Credit: There will likely not be opportunities for extra credit. If extra credit is available it will be available to the entire class. Do not ask for extra credit opportunities.

Viewing Graded Material: You will be able to view your graded assignments, quizzes, and exams in "My Grades"
